# The Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty

# **Rosemarket Community Council Report 2025**

The Rosemarket Community area consists of approximately 250 dwellings comprising the Rosemarket Village, and areas in the immediate surrounding area. Its budget from precept was £16800 in the 2025/26 financial year. It is subject to the provisions of the Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales) Act.

The Rosemarket Community Council controls, either solely or jointly, the following areas of publicly-accessible land:

## Westaway Park.

An area of 0.25 Ha of levelled, grassed recreational land, situated within the Village built-up area, and used by the public as general amenity land.

#### The Beacon.

An area of approximately 1.1Ha of public access land designated as a Village Green, situated on the northern edge of the Village. It has two distinct areas – the Upper Beacon, a grassed recreational area with a children's play area, and the Lower Beacon, a largely undeveloped area of land.

The Community Council, being aware of its responsibility to encourage biodiversity in its decision-making processes and land management, has undertaken / will undertake the following steps to date:

- 1) Consideration of how the Community Council can further enhance biodiversity is factored into all decisions made by the Community Council. As the minutes recording Community Council discussions and decisions are published online and in the community noticeboards, it is hoped that this will continue to heighten awareness of this issue in the local Community.
- 2) Grass-cutting on the Lower Beacon area has continued to be confined to rough cuts, sufficiently frequent to allow recreational use of the land for walking, dog walking, etc., but avoiding producing a manicured effect, and thus providing habitat for many wild species, especially in the uncut strips along the hedgelines, and also in the hedgerows themselves.
- 3) Consideration to further tree-planting on The Beacon and the triangle of land adjacent to the Village Hall will continue to be given where possible and practical, where funding allows, and where this aligns with the use of these areas for recreational purposes by local residents and visitors.

The Rosemarket Community Council Plan to promote biodiversity in its area will continue to be progressively developed and enlarged over future months and years, especially in relation to decision-making when considering grounds maintenance contracts and future investment in developing land in its ownership and control.
